- Be careful in agreeing to make improvements to places you can't see, such as roof repair, gutter clearing, tree trimming, or chimney cleaning.

Most importantly, tap into our list of reputable providers for more than 50 services, from paving to power-washing, excavating to exterminating. Our vendors are carefully vetted — they are experienced, licensed, and insured — and recommended by at least one of our members.

"Most *Staying Put* vendors offer a 10% or more discount. Make sure you ask!" says Barb.
